Call To Order

- Sustainability Officer Letter: EAC sent a letter recommending that the City of Bethlehem hire a sustainability officer to help implement the CAP. Sent to City Council, Mayor, WSP representative – support from WSP and Councilman Reynolds. Suggest reading aloud during the public comment period at City Council meeting
- Letter of support for the City's application for the Walkworks grant to PA
 Department of Health: transportation plan for the Broad Street West corridor

- 5. Committee reports
 - a. Bethlehem Backyards for Wildlife (BBFW)
 - b. Waste Reduction Committee: (Conner, Beth): Easton is providing venue for people to compost food scraps at their farmers market, facilitated by American Biosoils. Need \$4-5000 just missed grant deadline, so are there city funds available? Also can be promoted within the CAP. Possible to self-fund with \$20/year/person donations. Ben G. asked about the City doing it at their yardwaste facility, but this has already been rejected due to presence of food scraps lying around on site. Lynn

suggested contacting Kathy Fox as the food co-op might be a good site once their grocery store opens. Spencer is interested in seeing what can be done at York College and his community.

6. External committee reports

- a. City Council
- b. Planning: Westgate Mall; 1355 Easton Rd. Phase 2
 - 1355 Easton Rd: Comments by Public Works Dept. Forestry recommend planting 2 trees and state a shortfall of required landscaping. Consensus that the EAC draft letter in support of the City letter to make every attempt to follow required landscaping quidelines and consider energy efficient design for building.
 - Westgate Mall: Within current footprint of mall, so no need to act on.

 a. Climate Action Plan: 2 repeat stakeholder meetings held on June 17 (many EAC members attended); mitigation subgroup sectors forming – need 1 person to represent each subgroup as follows:

Transportation & Mobility: Ben G.

Food/Product sourcing and Waste: Beth or Elisabeth

Education and Behavior Change: Ben F.

Land Use & Green Space: Lynn

Buildings: Residential and Commercial: maybe Elisabeth? Brian H. suggested he would like to represent Transportation & Mobility, and Environmental and Climate Justice – particularly to encourage participation amongst the Hispanic community. Hold actual stakeholder meetings in Spanish, not just as a translation. It was suggested to reach out to Olga Negron.

8. New business

- a. Rose Garden (Nate Fisher): Every Saturday morning, volunteers (organized by the Mt Airy Neighborhood Association, and including Council President Adam Waldren) work on deweeding and applying mulch to the rose garden. Rosette disease is a virus carried by mites to roses and is spreading in the Rose garden, affecting over 30 rose bushes that have been tagged so far. Cause death in 1-3 years need to be removed and new plantings. Need around \$10,000 from the City to replant, and seeking grant from the organization that helped originally plant the roses. New roses are disease and pest resistant, attract bees, and repeat flower modern varieties that look like the older ones, and working to maintain same color scheme. Brian N. suggested working with BBFW to plant natives, some of which is already underway.
- b. Table at Rose Garden Farmers Market: 8th and West Raspberry Saturdays from June to October between 9-1. Lynn suggested a table to give away wildflower seeds EAC suggested using that opportunity to
